## Dja Dja Wurrung Clans Aboriginal Corporation

The Dja Dja Wurrung People are the Traditional Owners of Djandak (Dja Dja Wurrung Country), a cultural landscape that includes dreaming stories, lore, totemic relationships, songs, ceremonies and ancestral spirits.

Dja Dja Wurrung People see and relate to Country, people and entities in ways that are holistic and interconnected.

DJAARA is the trading name for the Dja Dja Wurrung Clans Aboriginal Corporation representing the interests of Dja Dja Wurrung People. In 2008 DJAARA gained Registered Aboriginal Party (RAP) status under the Aboriginal Heritage Act 2006 (Vic). RAP status embeds legislative functions as a decision maker and guiding voice, to further the fight for Dja Dja Wurrung People to be recognised as the Traditional Owners of **Djandak**, and be recognised as the experts in their Cultural Heritage. After 15 years of intensive negotiations, DJAARA and the Victorian Government signed the Recognition and Settlement Agreement (RSA) under the Traditional Owner Settlement Act 2010 (Vic) on 28 March 2013.

The Agreement is a means by which Dja Dja Wurrung tradition and the unique relationship of Dja Dja Wurrung People to **Djandak** are recognised, strengthened, protected, and promoted, for the benefit of all Victorians, now and into the future. The RSA binds the State of Victoria and DJAARA to a meaningful partnership founded on mutual respect.

Dja Dja Wurrung People have the right to participate fully in social, political, and economic life, to protect and develop their unique identity, and to make decisions about all of **Djandak**. This right persists regardless of Western legal understandings of tenure, including whether an area is classified as Crown land, freehold or otherwise.

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## **Executive Summary**

Victoria is transitioning from an ageing coal-fired energy system to legislated targets of 95% renewable energy by 2035. The infrastructure for this transition will take place on unceded lands of First Nations people and, at present, there are no legislated targets or enabling mechanisms to ensure Traditional Owners and/or their representatives will be engaged or will benefit from this transition.

DJAARA understands the need for a transition to a renewable energy future and supports the need for generation and transmission of renewable energy on and across **Djandak**.

DJAARA asserts Dja Dja Wurrung People's rights to determine where and under what terms this energy can be generated and transmitted.

DJAARA will not accept replacing one dirty industry with another that further harms Country. We must learn from the previous mistakes of fossil fuels and extractive mining industries.

The speed and scale at which the clean energy transition is happening is immense and comes with a unique set of challenges to navigate. The urgency to rapidly transform our energy systems to mitigate climate change risks perpetuating past dispossession and exclusionary decision-making. Traditional Owners have the right to self-determination and to Free, Prior and Informed Consent (FPIC) under the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP). These rights must be respected and upheld, regardless of the urgency to transition and current policy or legal frameworks.

The Renewable Energy Walking Track 2025–2034 (the Walking Track) is a 10 year-plan aligning with the Dhelkunya Dja Country Plan (2014–2034) and Nyauwi Mutjeka 'to keep the Sun' Renewable Energy Strategy.

This Walking Track will serve as a blueprint for DJAARA to achieve its commitments in Nyauwi Mutjeka while building on specific actions in the Climate Change Strategy - Turning 'wrong way' climate, 'right way', and contributing to the goals of the Dhelkunya Dja Country Plan.

This Walking Track is a way for Dja Dja Wurrung People to exercise our rights as Traditional Owners and self-determine priorities for renewable energy. Implementation of this Walking Track will support Dja Dja Wurrung People and all those who live on **Djandak** to achieve optimal outcomes and benefits from the renewable energy transition.

DJAARA has also developed a Partnerships and Benefit Sharing Guide to provide guidance on partnerships and benefit sharing agreements. This document outlines the standards and processes to establish meaningful partnerships that will enable DJAARA as Traditional Owners to lead projects, uphold cultural obligations, preserve cultural values and heritage, and support renewable energy projects in a culturally sensitive and safe manner



## **Strategic Vision**

DJAARA is committed to driving solutions that will achieve the vision to heal people, Country and climate through clean and renewable energy as outlined in both Nyauwi Mutjeka, Renewable Energy Strategy, and DJAARA's Climate Change Strategy.

Nyauwi Mutjeka provides long-term direction for DJAARA around renewable energy aspirations, projects, and investment. Most importantly, it is underpinned by the Dja Dja Wurrung People's duty of care towards future generations, energy justice for their communities and all First Nations people.

# DJAARA's renewable energy commitments as outlined in Nyauwi Mutjeka are:

By 2030 we want to be neutral in the harm our energy use causes people, nature and the climate.

Our commitments are to ensure our activities on **Djandak** heal Country, people and climate by:

- Developing policies and guidelines to reduce the energy impacts of our operations including from our buildings and vehicle fleet.
- Revisiting our own capacity to support people on Country with energy systems that align with the broader community transition to clean energy.
- Exploring opportunities to collaborate with government and industry on Dja Dja Wurrung led renewable energy and battery storage projects.

# **Key Principles**

The Dhelkunya Dja Country Plan (2014–2034) outlines five principles that are critically important to Dja Dja Wurrung People as they inform how Country is managed and are the foundation of any partnerships. The table below describes how these principles will be applied to guide decision-making around renewable energy.

DHELKUNYA DJA PRINCIPLES	DESCRIPTION IN THE RENEWABLE ENERGY CONTEXT
CULTURE	DJAARA will uphold its cultural obligations to look after Country for future generations. Renewable energy projects on <b>Djandak</b> should align with the Dhelkunya Dja Country Plan, align with Dja Dja Wurrung People's needs, honor Dja Dja Wurrung Ancestors, and protect Culture.  DJAARA will advocate for:  • Engagement, participation, identification, protection, management and conservation of Cultural Heritage for any type of renewable energy development and at all stages of development, from mining of critical minerals to decommissioning and end-of-life.  • Protection, management and conservation of Cultural Heritage from below Country (e.g. buried artefacts, objects and Ancestral remains), on Country (e.g. trees, plants, animals, waterways) to Sky Country (e.g. night sky, sight line vision of landscapes), caring for all life and spirit in between.  • Protection, management, research and conservation actions for culturally significant places to Dja Dja Wurrung People.  • Preservation of all Creation and cultural Stories, life on <b>Djandak</b> , including its plants and animals.  • Protection of culturally sensitive areas, significant landscapes, natural and cultural information.  • Establishing cultural exclusion zones for renewable energy development.  • Awareness, responsibilities and compliance under the Aboriginal Heritage Act 2006, including Cultural Heritage Management Plans, cultural heritage permits,
	cultural heritage agreements and implementation of recommendations identified through cultural heritage and landscape values assessments/cultural mapping.

	The Recognition and Settlement Agreement binds the State of Victoria and DJAARA to a meaningful partnership founded on mutual respect. It is a means by which Dja Dja Wurrung Culture, traditional practices and the unique relationship of Dja Dja Wurrung People to their traditional country are recognised, strengthened, protected and promoted, for the benefit of all Victorians, now and into the future.
	DJAARA will seek to work with partners on renewable energy projects that embody our values of Country and Culture, not undermine them.
	DJAARA will pursue partnerships that are committed to these shared principles:
	Transparency, openness and honesty
PARTNERSHIPS	Respectful and meaningful engagement
	Traditional Owner leadership
	Self-determination
	Free, Prior and Informed consent
	DJAARA expects to be engaged consistent with the right to Free, Prior and Informed Consent, from the beginning and at each stage – including completion and beyond – of all projects on Country.
	Partnerships should be led by DJAARA, include Dja Dja Wurrung People's voices, and respect cultural Lore and protocols.
	All renewable energy project partners and resulting agreements will be expected to support or advocate for protection of Country, Culture and mutual benefits for Dja Dja Wurrung People.

DHELKUNYA DJA PRINCIPLES	DESCRIPTION IN THE RENEWABLE ENERGY CONTEXT
	Renewable energy projects will respect, protect and preserve Country.  Any infrastructure development must seek to minimise harmful impacts to Country and will be assessed by DJAARA's <b>Malamiya</b> (Cultural Heritage) team and <b>Dja Dja Wurrekatjalangu</b> (Recognition and Settlement Agreement) team.
	It is essential that the below items are strictly followed during all Cultural Heritage assessments:
	Dja Dja Wu <mark>rrung Pe</mark> ople to be directly involved in all works
	Respecting men's and women's business
	Sufficient time to prepare and understand area of impact and educate others involved
LOOKING AFTER COUNTRY	The conservation and protection of the environment, in particular where culturally significant places to Dja Dja Wurrung People and natural values sites are located is paramount. The creation of cultural exclusion zones and right to veto renewable energy developments is key to looking after Country and supporting self-determination.
	All projects must have a net positive environmental outcome. Any rehabilitation work for project sites should use species endemic to <b>Djandak</b> that are culturally significant and aim to leave the Country in a healthier state than it was before the work started. All projects must prioritise healing Country as a key outcome.
	Thinking beyond environmental offsets, Country needs to be viewed holistically, and all projects must incorporate the principles of the Dhelkunya Dja Country Plan, to use the project to help heal and protect Country through Cultural Values Assessments and Cultural Mapping.
TRADITIONAL KNOWLEDGE	Dja Dja Wurrung People will maintain, control, protect and develop their traditional knowledge and traditional cultural expressions. It is important that cultural preservation and transfer of knowledge is led by Dja Dja Wurrung People and approached in a culturally safe and sensitive manner.  Learning about Country and traditional knowledge enables one to Care for Country.
KNOWLEDGE	We expect anyone who engages DJAARA to have an awareness of Dja Dja Wurrung cultural knowledge, ways, customs, language and cultural lore. This will help incorporate Dja Dja Wurrung traditional knowledge into all aspects of a partnership, project and decision making.

DHELKUNYA DJA PRINCIPLES	DESCRIPTION IN THE RENEWABLE ENERGY CONTEXT
	Renewable energy developments on Country will generate economic benefits which must be responsibly and equitably shared with Dja Dja Wurrung People. Any income generated from renewable energy projects will be invested into further improving outcomes for Dja Dja Wurrung People, future generations and healing Country.
	Generating economic benefits must be considered alongside other social and cultural benefits such as knowledge, language, building community, cultural connection and practice.
ECONOMIC	DJAARA strives to provide training and job pathways and to establish a range of ongoing suitable jobs for Dja Dja Wurrung People. This includes supporting the process of obtaining jobs including relocation and housing. Job creation and opportunities should exist from entry-level positions to leadership positions and specialist roles.
	DJAARA will also seek to support Dja Dja Wurrung businesses, education and scholarship opportunities. Supporting young Dja Dja Wurrung People is critical to ensure continuity and succession planning as the Dja Dja Wurrung community strives to unlock new economic opportunities and create intergenerational wealth.
	DJAARA will take advantage of economic opportunities and look for independent ownership for renewable energy projects or genuine partnerships where Dja Dja Wurrung People can lead.
	Ensuring DJAARA is adequately resourced to participate and drive engagement activities is critical to meet renewable energy development pressures and related opportunities.




# Renewable Energy Walking Track: 10-Year Plan

Eight focus areas have been identified for the Walking Track:

- 1. Bring Dja Dja Wurrung People along on the energy transition journey
- 2. Ensure Dja Dja Wurrung People have energy security and access to renewable energy
- 3. Protect culturally significant places and landscapes
- 4. Establish DJAARA-owned energy generation or storage projects
- 5. Support Dja Dja Wurrung People to access benefits and opportunities generated from renewable energy projects
- 6. Solutions for renewable energy waste and critical mineral mining concerns
- 7. Partnerships and engagement are guided by Culture and Lore
- 8. DJAARA is actively reducing the energy impact of our operations and is becoming a leader in renewable energy




Figure 1: The Walking Track's eight focus areas in relation to outcomes in Nyauwi Mutjeka

These focus areas link back to outcomes set in Nyauwi Mutjeka (see Figure 1, page 15) and also contribute towards actions in the Climate Change Strategy and goals in Dhelkunya Dja Country Plan.

DJAARA will review actions and outcomes under each focus area every two years to assess priorities and develop new initiatives where necessary.

We have a strong and diverse economic base to provide for our health and wellbeing and to strengthen our living Culture.



#### Goal 9 Galkangu - Joint Management

All Crown land on our Djandak is Aboriginal Title and we are the sole managers.



#### **NYAUWI MUTJEKA VISION**

To heal people, heal Country, and heal climate through clean and renewable energy.

The vision is informed by and feeds into several goals in the Dhelkunya Dja Country Plan 2014–2034.

#### **FOCUS AREA 1:**

## Bring Dja Dja Wurrung People along on the energy transition journey

Dja Dja Wurrung People have not been adequately informed or engaged about renewable energy, the changes and challenges from the energy transition, or pros and cons of renewable energy development on Country. Dja Dja Wurrung People cannot be expected to self-determine what a future with renewable energy looks like for them or make informed decisions without bridging this gap.

## Ensure Dja Dja Wurrung People have energy security and access to renewable energy

Dja Dja Wurrung People face historical disparities and economic marginalisation that restrict wealth, home and business ownership. This means Dja Dja Wurrung People will require additional support, information and capital to obtain energy security and access to renewable energy. Dja Dja Wurrung People have not been adequately informed about how to access renewable energy programs, rebates, subsidies or upgrades for their homes, businesses and vehicles.

DJAARA must ensure renewable energy projects do not harm Country or destroy culturally significant places and landscapes.

#### **FOCUS AREA 7:**

## Partnerships and engagement are guided by Culture and Lore

Renewable energy proponents and government want to engage in genuine consultation and partnerships with Dja Dja Wurrung People, but they do not always understand or respect cultural lores and protocols. They leave Dja Dja Wurrung People out of key decision making, creating tight timelines, with incompatible governance models and inadequate resourcing to engage Dja Dja Wurrung People widely.
